INTERIM MODERATOR: Reverend John Coutts

The end of last year saw us farewell Ian Hyslop and begin the process of looking for a new minister for St Andrew's church. While waiting for that position to be filled, we have been blessed with having Reverend John Coutts of Ashburton take on the role of Interim Moderator. It is a pleasure to have John share a little bit about himself in this edition.

'Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and his Bride has made herself ready: it was granted her to clothe herself with fine linen, bright and pure' - for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints. Dear friends, I have been asked to write something about myself and about the Church so here goes:

Born 1947, born again in 1965 after a dramatic encounter with evil and a brief search for good that ended in finding Jesus, I trained as a psychopaedic nurse at the then Royal New Zealand Foundation for the Blind. Married in 1970, Maureen and I have four children and seven grandchildren, with an eighth on the way! 1972 saw us buy a farm west of Kaikohe where we milked dairy goats and bred beef and sheep.

In 1980 we were called to ministry so the farm was sold, and the exciting adventure began. Since then, we have lived and worked from Papakura to Wyndham, in Ghana, West Africa to Glasgow, Scotland. I have lectured in bible colleges, worked in refugee camps, pubs and prisons, have ministered to royalty, politicians, drug addicts, alcoholics and

the spiritually bound. I have been on the wrong end of an AK47, and have met some amazing members of the Body of Christ.

It has been a tremendous privilege, and still is, as together we look to what God has in store for St. Andrew's, Geraldine. There is the issue of finding a new Minister, and that is a work in progress. (Do you pray for that process regularly or leave it up to others?) There is also the issue of spiritual growth of this part of the Body of Christ. (Are you getting yourself all prettied-up like a bride does, and, even more importantly, do you talk with the groom regularly?) My job is to ensure that the bride is getting prepared and that she is growing by reaching out to possible new members.

To repeat myself: Are you talking to Jesus regularly and expecting him to answer? Are you letting others know that he wants them to be a part of his lovely bride?

WHAT IS AN INTERIM MODERATOR?

A time of ministerial vacancy is a significant stage in the life of a congregation. It can produce feelings of loss, at the departure of the previous minister, and of uncertainty as to the future. It can also be a time of excitement and anticipation as the congregation looks to the mission and ministry to which God is calling them, now, and in the days ahead. During this time, a minister is appointed by Presbytery to ensure that Ministry of Word and Sacrament is still available to a congregation during a vacancy.

Sunday Kidz 2016



Every Sunday a dedicated team of teachers take time to lead our kids in bible stories, activities and prayer as part of our mission in the Contemporary Service at St Andrews church. Children & Families Coordinator, Susan D'Ath explains a little more about Sunday Kidz.

What an awesome bunch of kids we have at St Andrews! If you don't know any of them, I sincerely suggest you introduce yourself and get to know one or two of them. You can always ask them what they learnt at Sunday Kidz! This also (sometimes) helps reinforce what they have learnt.

This term we are focusing on the verse from 2 Timothy 1:7, 'God's Spirit fills us with power, love and self-control.' In Term 2 we will be focusing on learning the books of the Bible.

We have also been trying to encourage these kids to be courteous members of our church family - that means no biscuit-hogging or running around in the church or foyer! Parents please help remind them of this too. It is always good to be gentle, kind and patient (i.e. use our manners), and to be considerate of others at any age.

The 'butterfly bag' we use at St Andrew's during the offering is for children's giving/tithing and is a great way of getting them used to this concept. The money goes to UNICEF, the New Zealand Bible Society *Bibles for China* project and KidsCan. You may be like our family and scramble to find coins for the kids to put in the offering some weeks, or you may tithe by automatic payment, so your children may have no idea about it. Make it a discussion point at the table sometime so that your kids are aware, or help them come up with a plan as to how to give. It is all good intentional teaching - you are the best teachers of faith to your children!

I will be contacting families and getting some of you onto a Sunday Kidz parent help roster to assist the teachers, mainly with the older kids (ages 5-10). Your help will be essential with keeping behaviour in check and assisting with the hand-out sheets, craft work or clean up as we are a teacher short. As you see how things go, you may even consider going on the once-a-month teaching roster (material is supplied if you want to use it).

A reminder, too, that our church library resources are there to be utilised by anyone. Help yourself. There is a clipboard where you can write the title and date when you borrow it, and tick off when it is returned. Pretty simple really. Many family specific resources have been added, but there are lots of devotional books for different ages and stages, and a variety of DVDs that could be for home-viewing, or cell groups. One watched recently by the Friday morning group is the 'War Room'.

Easter is nearly here - a significant date in the Christian calendar. Why not check the service dates and times and invite some families, friends, neighbours or work mates along. It could be an easy way of connecting with others. Kids can get on it, too, by making invites or helping deliver hot cross buns (as a family, or as part of the church outreach opportunity). Happy Easter everyone!

RECOGNISING EASTER IN ART 2016: The 'I am's' of Christ



Last year, Local Artist, Beth Heatlie spent the week of Easter painting seven images (pictured) in St Andrew's Church. This year she is at it again with the 'I am' statements of Christ.

Last year, our minister Ian Hyslop approached me to do some paintings in the church during the week before Easter. After some thought and discussion, we decided on paintings that would represent the words Jesus spoke from the cross. Each day was devoted to a different painting. The people who visited the church to see the displays seemed very interested in what I was doing - it was lovely to be able to chat to the folk who stopped to watch the progress of the paintings.

The final work, 'Peace be with you', was a large painting of the Risen Christ that I based on a huge stained glass window in the Catholic Church of the Resurrection in Bryanston, South Africa. The priest there, Father Keith Gordon-Davis, kindly gave me

permission to copy the window. That painting now lives in Wanaka and is hanging in Ian's study. The other six paintings were also sold with the proceeds going to St Andrew's missions department.

This year I plan to do something similar - charcoal and acrylic drawings depicting the 'I am' statements of Jesus that we find in the Gospel of John, with the last one for Easter Sunday, being, 'I am the resurrection and the life...' **BETH HEATLIE**





Season of Lent

Many of us know that Lent is the 40 days leading up to Easter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday (Ash Wednesday gets its name from the practice of using ashes made from palm branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday in a ceremony). Lent represents the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness being tempted by Satan before he began his ministry. (The 40 days of Lent don't include the Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday, which explains why there are in fact 46 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday.) Often people use the season of Lent as a time of fasting from a specific food (these days it could also be no internet time) and instead spend time focusing on their relationship with Jesus. Whether or not you have thought about focusing on Jesus in this way through the season Lent, during the week leading up to Easter, consider what part of your day you could set aside to pray, listen to God, and read his word.

EASTER EVENTS:

Journey to the cross and the empty tomb

As we make our way towards Easter, there are many events that we know are part of this important journey but may not have taken time to consider them. Or we find ourselves so busy that before we know it, we are at Easter Sunday. During the week leading up to Easter, there are several church services and events that you are welcome to come along to. Each service reflects on a various aspect of Christ's journey to the cross and the ultimate victory over sin and death. Here are some of the services and events that happen in and around St Andrew's church over the Easter week as we head towards Easter Sunday..

PALM SUNDAY SERVICES SUNDAYS 20 MARCH: 9.30AM; 11AM

On the Sunday before Easter we celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. As Jesus journeyed into the city, the crowd around him 'spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road' (Matthew 21:8). This demonstrated that the crowd were giving Jesus the 'royal treatment' similar to what had happened for King Jehu at his coronation. In the gospel of John we also read that the crowd cut down branches from palm trees (John 12:13) and shouted out 'Hosanna!' This event had been prophesied by Zechariah about 500 years earlier (Zechariah 9:9). Not only were there particular details of Jesus riding on a donkey that hadn't been ridden on before, and what the people would cry out, but it appears that even the particular day on which this would happen was predicted. Among all this celebration, Jesus knew that he was walking towards the cross - towards pain and suffering and separation from God his Father - something unbearable and unthinkable. And yet he knew this had to happen so that we could be reunited with God through the salvation that could only come from Jesus' death. He also knew that beyond this suffering was resurrection for him and eternal life for all who would believe. The week leading into Easter is a time of extreme highs and lows. Jesus went through every imaginable emotion. We can reflect on



all these situations that Jesus went through and realise that we have a God who understands us extremely well. Our God does not watch us from a distance. He created us, he sent his Son to live among us, to go through all the human emotions that we might also face, die for us and to come back to life to remind us that after all that we might go through, if we believe in him we, too, will rise again into eternal life. Take time to read your bible and think about the thoughts and feelings Jesus would have had each step to the cross.

TENEBRAE SERVICE THURSDAY 24 MARCH: 8PM

The service of Tenebrae, meaning 'darkness' or 'shadows,' has been practised by the church since medieval times. Once a service for the monastic community, Tenebrae later became an important part of the worship of the common folk during Holy Week. We join Christians of many generations throughout the world as we celebrate this service which is a meditation on Christ's suffering. Scriptures trace the story of Christ's journey to the cross,



and the power of silence and darkness suggests the drama of this momentous day. The service begins in candlelight only. The flames of the candles are extinguished one by one as scripture is read to tell the story of Holy Week. This gradual descent into gloom is a representation of Jesus' increasing sorrow as the events of the Passion unfolded. After the last verse is read, the last candle is put out, and the room is plunged into darkness. As lights are extinguished, we are invited to ponder the depth of Christ's suffering and death; we remember the cataclysmic nature of his death and through the return of the small but persistent flame of the Christ candle at the conclusion of the service, we anticipate the joy of ultimate victory. The Tenebrae Service is, by its nature, a quiet, solemn, meditative time of contemplation. It is the service of shadows that gives way to the victorious Easter Sunday service of victory, which celebrates Christ's resurrection from the dead. At St Andrew's we also include Communion in our Tenebrae Service. If you have not attended a Tenebrae Service before, I encourage you to join us.

at the crucifixion of Jesus. Now they wake up to the news that the tomb his body was placed in is empty and there are people seeing Jesus alive, and angels appearing to tell the good news. They see the empty tomb, they finally comprehend what Jesus had explained to them would happen... and they believe. On the cross, Jesus paid for all the sins of those who had lived, those who were living at the time, and for all of us who were yet to be born. His resurrection made it clear that if we believed in who Jesus said he was, we would also be resurrected to live again forever with Him. No more tears, no more pain, no more suffering, loneliness, illness, hatred, and no more separation from God our creator. Whatever challenges you may be facing at the present time or may face in the future, Easter is a time to remind us that God is in control and has the greatest plans for us. Now that's worth getting together and celebrating!

Good Friday Walk of Witness


EASTER SUNDAY SERVICE THE GREATEST DAY IN HISTORY! SUNDAY 27 MARCH: 10.30AM

This is the most important day in all of history and one to celebrate together with the understanding of what the empty tomb means. The disciples have gone through all the highs and lows throughout the week, left in pain, fear and confusion



The Old Rugged Cross

In 1912, a travelling evangelist in Michigan, George Bennard, was consistently heckled by several youth for his faith. Troubled by the disregard that was shown towards the gospel message, Bennard turned to the Bible for reflection and encouragement. He focused on Christ and the Cross and recognised that the two were inseparable. From this point he wrote the first verse of a hymn, finding the melody coming easily to him. Several months later the remaining three verses were also completed. He performed his hymn to a pastor and his wife who were supporting his ministry, then on June 7, 1913, accompanied by guitar he sang his hymn for the first time at a revival service in a hops barn that catered as a church building. We still sing it more than 100 years later at Easter time.



SINGER/SONGWRITER ROB BERG: Bringing the gospel message through music

Born and raised in Chilliwack B.C. (Canada) with a wonderful family (father, mother, and four sisters), Rob has been a Christian and involved in music since his early teens. Though still based in Chilliwack, since 1987 he has been ministering full-time, travelling to over 30 countries to date (including Romania, Russia, Germany, South Africa, New Zealand, Cambodia, and Vietnam) to 'share the living Christ with both saint and sinner'.

As a singer/songwriter/missionary (or musicianary as he calls himself) he has ministered in a vast array of settings and venues, and with almost every denomination of church there is, as well as many missions groups.

Singing and preaching, and sharing the gospel of our Lord Jesus in main centres and in many cases, off the beaten path, has taken Rob around the world and connected him to many people groups, some of which would not have heard the gospel ever really presented.

In a style best described as folk-rock, Rob accompanies himself on guitar and piano, singing his own original songs inspired by his own life experiences and adventures with Christ. Rob has won several awards and received multiple nominations for the Canadian gospel music awards.

'I love what I do,' says Rob. 'It is, at the same time, the most fulfilling, exhilarating, difficult, frightening, rewarding, adventurous, gut-wrenching, lonely, and meaningful thing I've ever done. I have decided to pursue meaning, not happiness, in life, and I am convinced there is no greater meaning and no higher cause for one to live and die for, than to follow Christ and the call of God'.




